If you were around in 1915, following are some interesting facts about the United States.

Woodrow Wilson was president; Thomas R. Marshall was the vice president; and the population of this country was 100,546,000.

The one-millionth Ford automobile rolled off the assembly line, the cost of a First Class stamp was two cents, unemployment was 8.5 percent, and federal spending was just under \$1 billion.

In sports, the Boston Red Sox defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 4-1, the Vancouver Millionaires won the Stanley Cup, the Kentucky Derby champion was Regret, and Cornell was the NCAA football champion with a 9-0-0 record. Because of World War I, Wimbledon wasn't held that year. Babe Ruth hits his first career home run.

And, scandalous though it may been considered then,

John B. Kendrick

Wyoming 1915

In Wyoming, John B. Kendrick was sworn in as governor on Jan. 4, 1915, and left office on Feb. 26, 1917. He resigned to take an elected seat in Congress, and was replaced by (then) Secretary of State Frank L. Houx, who served until Jan. 6, 1919.

Pine Bluffs 1915
That same year the Pine Bluffs

Post announce in January it would begin publishing on Thursday to accommodate readers.

Ladies could buy ready-towear skirts for \$2, and children's wool under garments were halfprice at Carlstrum's Dry Goods Store, and it was cash only.

Postmaster C.W Johnson retired in April1915 after 23 years of service to the community. Bulk Japan green tea could be purchased for 40 cents per pound, and canned tomatoes that normally sold for \$10 a can could

be purchased on special three cans for 25 cents, strictly cash of course, at T.E. Robinson's Store.

At the time, some of the needs of Pine Bluffs were stated as being an industrial club, and a commercial club for those who wanted to expand their interests, and for the betterment of Pine Bluffs. A night school, reading circle and public restroom, as well as a public library, and a city park where one could get away from the cares of the day were

some of the ideas expressed 100 years ago.

The public restrooms, two of them actually, were established in 1915 in Pine Bluffs. These rooms provided the wives and children of men who came into town to transact business a place of respite, to relax, visit, and see to the children, and were considered a very important feature of the town..

The Union-Pacific railroad kept a regular schedule, with five regular eastbound trains every day; four westbound trains, and three freight trains every week, transporting visitors, freight, new business, and residents to and from Pine Bluffs.

## Farmers State Bank comes to town

And, on April 1, 1915, there was only one bank in Pine Bluffs; Pine Bluffs State Bank. But this would change, very soon.

On May 1, 1915, Farmers State Bank officially opened it's doors on the corner of Main and Second streets. That original building still stands, but due to

the growing needs of a prosperous business, the bank moved into the bigger building where it still does business today.

The Pine Bluffs State Bank, which was located directly across the street from the original Farmers State Bank, in what is now the Pine Bluffs Police

Department, unfortunately was not able to sustain itself as a viable bank in Pine Bluffs, and closed its doors a few years later, making Farmers State Bank the only home owned and home operated financial institution in Pine Bluffs.

It has been one hundred years, and the bank has stood the test of time, making it through the Great Depression, recessions and rumors. There is only one business entity in Pine Bluffs which is older, and that is the Town of Pine Bluffs.

Shortly after opening its

doors in 1915, Farmers State Bank was one of two groups to open those famous public restrooms in Pine Bluffs. If you wanted to save money, or teach your children the value of a \$1, Farmers State Bank would issue a small metal bank that was locked, and only someone at the bank could unlock it for the holder.

On opening day, the ladies received carnations, and the men cigars; a much gentler and more Victorian time.


#### Mark Kiolbasa

This year, Farmers State Bank proudly celebrates a century of service to Pine Bluffs and the residents of southeast Wyoming.

In an interview for the Pine Bluffs Post on April 29, 1915, our first president, Mr. E. W. Stone, set forth the goal of the bank. "The Farmers State Bank will aim to do a good conservative banking business and ask a share of the patronage of the farmers, merchants and citizens of this community and promise good service and fair treatment." Mr. Stone also recognized the importance of the bank's infrastructure and giving back to the community. This was evidenced by his opening of the Bank's Board Room and lavatory to serve as a rest room when wives and families of farmers made the long trip into Pine Bluffs.

Much has changed in the 100 years since Mr. Stone spoke these words. The roads of Pine Bluffs are now paved. Cars and pickup trucks have replaced horses, trains, and the Model-T as the primary modes of transportation. The silver dollar has given way to debit and credit cards for making purchases.

However, the words Mr. Stone spoke ten decades ago are as relevant today as when he first spoke them. If the bank stays true to its original goal of operating in a conservative manner, being fair in all its dealings, providing excellent customer service in a safe and comfortable environment, as well as offering the products and conveniences customers expect, it will be successful.

With that in mind, over the next several months, the bank is moving forward to install ATM machines to allow customers access to their cash around the clock. We are looking to remodel our branch and add a drive up lane for added convenience. We are in the process of reviewing our loan and deposit products to make them even more competitive in the marketplace. We are looking at our technology and plans are being made to upgrade our website, online banking, and other systems. Lastly, we are exploring branching opportunities in Cheyenne and hope to add a second location in the next 18 months. As we reflect on 100 years in business and the changes we are preparing to implement, the Board of Directors and staff feel Farmers State Bank is well-positioned for the future and are excited to enter our second century in community banking. This has lead us to our new mission statement — To be the best bank in Wyoming as judged by its customers, employees, shareholders, and communities it serves.
