Geo. W. Gardner, highly respected citizen, passed away at his home 12 miles northwest of Pine Bluffs, last Friday morning after a several months' illness.

Until a few days previous to his death, when influenza developed, Mr. Gardner was improving in health. Because of his weakened condition, he was unable to overcome this illness and passed away very suddenly Friday morning.

During the fourteen years Mr. Gardner lived in this vicinity he made many friends, as was shown by the beautiful floral offerings and the large attendance at the funeral services Sunday.

Geo. W. Gardner was born in the state of Ohio, May 26, 1868, and passed away at his home 12 miles northwest of Pine Bluffs, February 16, 1934.

He was united in marriage to Minnie Land June 15, 1907, at Twin Falls, Idaho. To this union was born one son, Neil, who is now employed at the city light plant.

Mr. and Mrs. Gardner and son came to Pine Bluffs in 1920 and located on a farm 12 miles northwest, where they have since resided.
